PLENARY - Form Follows Function: Purpose Driven Data Collection, Analysis, and Communication

AAPOR long has been a BIG TENT welcoming all those interested and studying public opinion and survey research from a variety of perspectives. However, we normally talk about that big tent from the standpoint of the various sorts of places we work at – academic settings, large for-profit firms, small businesses, the government, nonprofit organizations – or our personal characteristics – age, years of experience in the field, gender, race and ethnic backgrounds. But, AAPOR also is a place for people engaging in a variety of different roles and expertise in the polling and survey process. Some of us focus almost exclusively on methodological considerations whether it be sampling, data collection, or weighting procedures. And then we have those who focus on questionnaire design including question wording or survey formatting, or the implementation process including understanding the impact of incentives or interviewer-respondent interactions. Others focus on analysis, or the writing and dissemination of results. And some of us are generalists, doing a little bit of everything. But one of the things that we ALL share is that we are collecting, analyzing, and making available data and information that we expect will serve a purpose – whether it is informing a decisionmaker, a client, a policymaker, a journalist, an advocacy organization, or a member of the public about what the public (or some specific segment of the public) thinks, knows, or experiences on a given topic.

This plenary gives us the opportunity to hear from some of those audiences: A Policy Advocate, A Journalist and a Policymaker, and hopefully can help us explore new ways that we can continue to make our data the most useful for them. How do they use surveys? How do they perceive the various types of surveys that may come across their desks? How do the choices we make in design help or hurt when they try to use the data for their purposes? Why do some survey data points go viral and become a ubiquitous part of public discussions and others never get cited? What different considerations do our audiences have when assessing survey results than what we may have as survey designers, methodologists, or analysts? Overall, then, what can learn about our profession from some of our key audiences?
